
PLANET CARETAKERS

The boy stepped back and the mossy patterns on the stone began to take shape into letters, which glimmered with a strange green light.


...In which the child makes a promise


The boy thanked them. Then he turned and climbed onto the Stag's broad back and they left the clearing accompanied by Bear, Wolf and Eagle.

They struggled on, blinded by the black fog and stumbling over roots and brambles. Quickly they became separated and finally Stag stopped.




"Do not fear my child, it is me they want." There was a stillness and a gathering and a focusing of the evil.

a diary-to write one kind thing you did or thought today for the environment, an animal or a person


a dragon whose scales you can colour in each time you have done something kind and maybe you can reward yourself with a little treat when you have so many

The Sacred Oath sheet which you can sign and put on your wall to remember the promise you made


There is a workbook in case you want to do some work with a group of friends




Dragon Reward Card

Introduction to workbook

Aims:

This pack is a programme designed:

- To enhance morality and values through the development of compassion and respect.
- To develop spiritual intelligence by becoming aware of connectedness to all sentient beings.
- To promote kindness to all living things.

Who is it for?

- Anyone of any age, differentiated material can be used across the age ranges.
- Specific children who have been identified as having harmed an animal.

Criteria for involvement of young people in the cohort:

- Between the ages of 5 and 14
- Have been know to deliberately cause animals harm, either repeatedly or for longer periods of time
- There is good evidence that the reported events did take place
- Written permission from parents or carers for them to take part
- The experimental group must have access to a carer or support worker who can reliably carry through the

programme on a day to day basis

• The control group may well comprise those who do not have such access

Objectives:

To address these issues by looking at attitudes towards the treatment of animals.

To raise awareness of society and its general views about such matters.

To reflect on personal attitudes in these matters

There is a drastic increase in mental health problems in our society for both children and adults. Animals are a natural area of interest and education for many children. They can experience a range of feelings towards different animals from deep desire to nurture, to a massive fear and revulsion. This pack provides an opportunity to harness the interest that most children have in animals and develop empathy, caring and respect for all life. Acting kindly is a sound base for positive relationships whether children or adults. According to the RSPCA research September 2001the issues of animal abuse are still prevalent across the social structures of our society. In a few this can lead to violence towards people in adult life and has been sensationally associated as a precursor with serial killers. Whilst much work has been done in this area in a generalised way, particularly in USA with Humane Society very little seems to have been directed to working therapeutically with individuals.

Individual use:

If a child has been identified as having harmed an animal the pack must be used in conjunction with a parent or carer. Whilst it has been designed initially for younger children the materials and story are relevant to young people and adults of all ages. I would recommend that workers in this field use the recording as a basis for development of the metaphor with age appropriate language.

Research programme:

Before giving the child the pack it is important to do the attitudinal survey-a copy of this must be sent to Bob Spalding at The University of Liverpool. It must also be completed after the initial month and again three months later.

The child should be given the Unicorn Pack and open it with the adult in a peaceful atmosphere of interest and exploration.

It has been designed to engage with children and the initial moments will motivate further use of the materials. Young people could be engaged by being invited to comment on how they think children would respond. A reward e.g. cinema tickets, animal video could be offered for their efforts.

The pack should be used for at least a month. The CD can be listened to together and then it is recommended that the child should listen to it at least three times a week in bed before sleeping. The reason for this is that just before sleep we are highly suggestible and it will allow the unconscious mind to work in dream time painlessly.

Additional suggestions:

The local RSPCA will always visit schools to provide awareness raising sessions and some excellent worksheets to support the theme.

A visit to an animal farm is recommended BUT please make sure there are enough adults around to give complete protection to animals.

Animals should never be used as a 'cure' for human behaviour difficulties-animals should be protected at all times from dangerous and cruel behaviour especially if there has been an individual history of such acts.

This pack contains a range of materials which need to be checked and listened to by the adult for suitability for individual children.

CD and Diary are vital to the programme, the rest are optional.

1. C.D.

It is vital for the adult to listen to the recording first.

The story has been deliberately designed and developed as a metaphor that will address the unconscious mind without being judgmental. The language is stylised because it is intended to be listened to in a state of relaxation not as a cognitive adventure. The story is written in the book to be read to/with the children/young people.

This way of working aims to change the behaviour of the child/adult by developing 'rescuing' feelings towards other living beings.

The underlying belief system upon which this is built is that all human beings have compassion deep within and that it is possible to supply an opportunity for this to reveal itself even in the most harrowing of circumstances.

- **2. The Diary** is to be completed daily-there are two parts:
- 'Today I' This is to be some kind act to child has done during the day to an animal or person as simple as smile, make a cup of tea anything-the truth is not relevant at this time-the purpose of this exercise is to get the child to start 'thinking' about 'acting kindly'-
- The rest of the page is left blank for the child to develop their own 'adventure' creative writing based on the Planet caretakers story. This can be done in conjunction with the adult or on their own-each day the story can develop of them rescuing and animal with the help of the 'gifts' and the 'companions'.

3. The 'Dragon' card is a reward card.

Discussion of rewards with regard to the topic can take place at the beginning without too much emphasis. Each day a scale can be coloured in after discussion with the child if there is some positive movement in their attitude-at the end of the month make sure that the 30 scales have been achieved and a mutual treat agreed at the beginning is planned.

e.g. a trip to the zoo, city farm, film about animal, Disney animal video bought(e.g. Lion King)

4. The Promise card can be signed after the story has been listened to, when the child is ready. It can be stuck on the wall as a reminder.

- **5. Gifts.** Treasure Chest to decorate with treasures, silver pen and feather relevant to the story.
- **6. Workbook** consists of photocopiable sheets applicable to different ages.
- **7. Video and Play Script** for use with groups.
- **8. The video** can be watched and used as a basis for discussion of these issues. The other materials can be used as and when appropriate.

At the end of the month please give the attitudinal survey again and if possible after a further 3 months. The University may wish to return after a year or more to see whether there is a lasting effect on the children.
